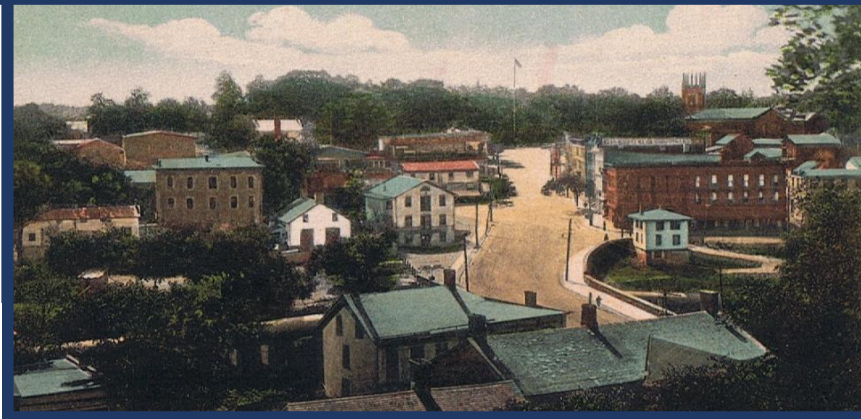

THE MESIER PROJECT

SUNY New Paltz history student and intern for WHS, Danielle Sweetser gave a short presentation at our March meeting describing her findings thus far about the history of the Mesier family and Pieter Jansen Mesier, great-grandfather to Peter Mesier who came to Wappingers Falls. Danielle expounded on her investigative journey describing some baffling challenges and “eureka” moments in her research. Consultations with author and New Netherlands expert, Dr. Jaap Jacobs; Hudson Valley artist, Len Tantillo and Mesier descendent, Dr. Andrew Hendricks aided Danielle in her research. Danielle was able to discover Pieter Jansen Mesier arrived in the New Netherlands around 1659 at the age of 18 or 19. He may have been a soldier with the West India Company. In 1685 Mesier erected a mill near Cortland and Wall Street. The street was appropriately named Windmill Lane. The windmill stood on the west side in the area of the present day World Trade Center. The huge sails of the windmill could be seen from great distances offering ships a useful landmark when navigating the waters near the tip of Manhattan. Danielle’s presentation was enhanced by several visual displays including a representation of the Mesier family tree, a copy of a map of Manhattan c.1695 depicting the location of the Mesier mill (donated to WHS by Len Tantillo) and a copy of an original painting titled *Mesier Mill, c.1695* by Len Tantillo (purchased by WHS and now on display). 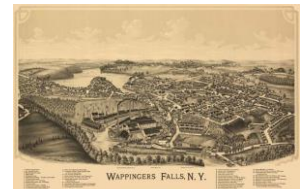

COLLECTIONS AND ARCHIVES

The purpose of the Collections and Archives Committees is to acquire, preserve and present items of historical value that pertain to the Village of Wappingers Falls and surrounding communities. Our repository includes a research library, archives and museum artifacts. The historical society is also curator of one of the largest collections of Native American artifacts on the east coast.

Some of the materials in our Research Library and Archives include the John R. Ferris Civil War Library Collection, historical books pertaining to the growth and development of the village and town, photographs, directories, newspapers, maps, scrapbooks and archival records such as billheads, letters and documents.

Currently access to the Research Library and Archives is available to members by appointment. Eileen is happy to assist you in your research. 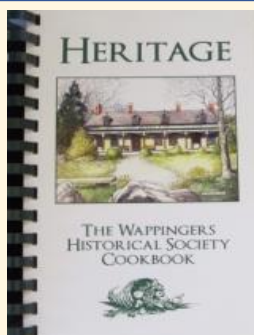
MYSTERY PHOTO: THE COLONIAL HOTEL.

FAMOUS HORTON HOUSE SCONES

(p327) Contributed by John & Cynthia Vergilii, owners of the historic Joseph Horton House also known as "Old Hundred".

INGREDIENTS:

- 1 ¾ C. sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 ¼ tsp. baking powder
- ¼ C. salted butter, softened
- 2 extra-large eggs
- ¼ C. heavy cream
- ⅓ C. dried cranberries
- ⅓ C. white chocolate chips
- ⅓ C. sweetened flaked coconut

DIRECTIONS:

Preheat oven to 400°. Mix all ingredients in a large bowl. Make "loosely packed", round mounds about 2" in size. Place onto greased cookie sheet and bake on middle rack about 10-15 minutes or until lightly browned on top. Makes 12 scones. Serve with clotted cream and jam. These scones freeze very well and will keep up to 3 weeks.
